# **Extreme Weather Warnings Fail to Trigger Climate Action: Study**

"Apocalyptic images of raging typhoons, rising seas and submerged buildings do not scare people into worrying about climate change or shifting to planet-friendly lifestyles, a new study suggests.

"A group of Hong Kong residents exposed to a virtual simulation of a super-typhoon projected to hit Hong Kong sometime between 2050 and 2100 were not motivated to change their behaviour, and were actually less inclined to see climate change as a risk or take climate action.

"The simulation was based on Typhoon Mangkhut, which battered parts of the Philippines, Guam and China in 2018, killing 134 people and causing US\$3.8 billion in damage. Storms like Mangkhut are projected to get more frequent and intense as seas warm and sea-levels rise.

"But individuals who experienced what the future climate reality could be like were not motivated to make behavioural changes, particularly climate sceptics and people who already live more eco-friendly lives, the study of 1,500 Hongkongers by Singapore Management University (SMU) found. .....

# Circuses Have Evolved – So Must Climate **Summits**

"What are UN conferences for? Every year the UN climate body (UNFCCC) finds a new country in which to hold a summit (Cop), at which delegates from nearly 200 nations negotiate an ever smaller number of global climate rules, and journalists wonder what's newsworthy enough to write about.

"Luckily, at Cop27 in Sharm El-Sheik, Egypt, in November, the delegates manufactured a last-minute crisis which provided some good copy. But quite a few of the correspondents had already filed their 'what's the point of this annual circus? articles by then.

"Nearly 50,000 people attended Cop27. This obviously had nothing to do with the inviting beaches and lively night life of the Red Sea resort.

"Nor, in reality, did it have much to do with the UN climate talks. Only a few thousand of those attending were national negotiators. The rest – as every year – were representatives from businesses, international organisations, NGOs and research institutes. They were taking part in a physically adjacent but otherwise largely separate global climate expo. The Cop fringe programme ran to thousands of events and meetings.

"That the formal UN talks have become rather small should not be a surprise. ....

"Visit any modern circus and you'll see it has evolved since the days of freak shows and performing lions. It's time for Cops to do the same.

### Valuing Nature: The Case for Nature-Related Assessment & Disclosure

"The connection between nature and business is deep, with trillions of dollars of economic value across geographies and sectors dependent upon nature and its services.

"This report by the SustainAbility Institute by ERM and the Capitals Coalition, addresses challenges facing companies in the complex and rapidly evolving nature arena, particularly those regarding the Taskforce on Nature-related Financial Disclosures (TNFD) Framework scheduled to launch in September 2023.

"Few companies, if any, can claim to be fully removed from the impacts of natural systems on the global economy. As nature degradation and loss increase, the private sector will likely be impacted by resulting reductions in global annual GDP. The protection of natural systems now could not only mitigate potential economic losses but also provide positive benefit to businesses while improving biodiversity, limiting the effects of climate change, and strengthening local economies.

"As more corporates recognise the business case of protecting natural systems, the case for nature-related disclosure will follow. Like the way the Task Force on Climate-Related Financial Disclosures (TCFD) Framework supports more comprehensive reporting on climate, the TNFD Framework will help guide companies in disclosing information relating to nature-related risks and opportunities.....

#### **Miracle Trees!**

"Maradi, Niger – For centuries, rich woodlands dotted this dusty, sun-blasted region south of the Sahara. There were fat locust bean trees, wispy bushes, and sparse pockets of winter thorn and tamarind. By the time Ali Neino was a boy in the 1980s, however, just one lonely tree sprouted from his family's land, and he could see clear to the horizon.

"There was no vegetation in between the village and the fields', recalls Neino, 45 'No trees, no shrubs, nothing.'

"Decades of drought, land-clearing, and demand for firewood had left Niger nearly treeless. Intensive farming to feed the world's fastest-growing population ensured new trees would not take root. Government efforts to reforest in the 1970s failed. Sixty million trees were planted; fewer than 20%

"But on a recent stroll along his family's farm outside Dan Saga, Neino pointed to the trees growing everywhere. Sunbleached acacia trunks poked through the soil. Branches and fallen leaves littered the yellow dirt. Five kinds of acacia grew. There were fruit-bearing trees and a type of warty bush known as dooki.

"In the past 35 years, as scientists begged nations to get serious about reviving forests, one of Earth's poorest countries, in one of the planet's harshest regions, added an astonishing 200 million new trees - maybe more. Across at least 12 million acres of Niger, woodlands have been reestablished with little outside help, almost no money, and without driving people off their land. The trees here weren't planted; they were encouraged to come back naturally, nurtured by thousands of farmers. Now, fresh trees are popping up in village after village. As a result, soils are more fertile and moister, and crop yields are up .....

### **Mushrooms and Hemp Insulation**

"David Benjamin's recipe for construction materials sounds like witchcraft: Mix corn stalks with hemp and mushroom roots, pour the mixture into moulds which resemble the shapes you need, and voilà, the building material will grow all by itself. In five days!

"Simply put, this is the process of mycotecture, architecture with mushrooms.

"Fungi and facades are unlikely friends architects usually prefer not to mention in the same breath. But Beniamin named his New York architecture firm The Living because he wants exactly that: to bring architecture alive, literally. 'Biological systems are adaptable; they live, breathe and regenerate themselves', he says in his office in the Brooklyn Navy Yard. 'Imagine buildings had these traits! This would change our way of life radically.'

"Maybe even more importantly, organic materials do not create trash. 'Forty percent of the trash in our landfills is from construction', .... 'Maybe we better look for materials which don't sit in landfills for centuries and millennia.' ....

# 'Climate Quitters': 20% of UK Workers Turn **Down Jobs Based on Poor ESG Commitments**

"KPMG surveyed around 6,000 UK adult office workers, students, apprentices and those who have left higher education in the past six months on their attitudes to work.

"The results, published today (24th January), show ESG factors are influencing employment decisions for almost half of UK workers. Indeed, the survey found 46% want the company they work for to publish and demonstrate ambitious ESG commitments.

"The survey also found 20% of respondents have turned down job offers based on a company's ESG values not aligning with their own. This rises to 33% for those aged 18-24, suggesting this could become a much more common trend over the coming years. ....

"Reports suggest 3.2 million workers will need to 'boost their skills' if the UK is to meet its 2050 net-zero target. This figure covers upskilling and retraining. Among the sectors most affected, the report states, are construction and transportation, where 30% and 26% of workers respectively will need upskilling.

"However, new jobs created to help drive the UK's transition to net-zero could pay 18% more than the national average salary - and 30% more than the average salary offered by companies in high-emitting sectors.

#### WEF: Global Risks Report 2023

"Last year's Global Risks Report warned that a divergent economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic risked deepening divisions at a time when collaboration was urgently required to address looming global challenges. Yet despite hard-learned lessons around the interdependence of global risks, few would have anticipated the extent of instability that would soon unfold, this time driven by a new war in Europe.

"The health and economic aftereffects of the pandemic have quickly spiraled into compounding crises. Carbon emissions have climbed, as the post-pandemic global economy fired back up. Food and energy have become weaponised by the war in Ukraine, sending inflation soaring to levels not seen in decades, globalising a cost-of-living crisis and fueling social unrest. The resulting shift in monetary policy marks the end of an economic era defined by easy access to cheap debt and will have vast ramifications for governments, companies and individuals, widening inequality within and between countries.

"Yet much-needed attention and resources are being diverted from newly emerging or rapidly accelerating risks to natural ecosystems, human health, security, digital rights and economic stability which could become crises and catastrophes in the next decade. ....

# Rich Countries' Stinginess, Spread Too Thin

"This week's devastating earthquake in Turkey and Syria wasn't caused by climate change. But it is another strain on a humanitarian system which, because of climate change and rich countries' stinginess, is spread too thin.

"More and more people are needing help as climate change makes storms, floods, droughts and heatwaves worse. Alongside that, there are the regular disasters – the earthquakes, volcanoes, tsunamis, wars, pandemics and terrorist attacks.

"But the supply of help isn't keeping up with demand. We published a deep dive this week into how cutbacks at the United Nations hindered the international community's response to the floods in Pakistan.

"Six months on from the rains, about 200,000 people are still displaced, a harvest has been missed, winter has come and malaria is rife. 'Humanitarians have failed in this disaster', Islamic Relief's Pakistan chief told us.

"That's not surprising as the UN agency tasked with coordinating the international response had just seven people working for it in Pakistan when floods hit – down from 35 in 2016

"They scrambled in staff from other countries when disaster struck. The same people are probably off to Turkey now. They'll be somewhere else next. But the UN shouldn't have to play whack-a-mole when people's lives are at stake.

# The Role of Regulation and Policy in Incentivising Scope 3 GHG Reporting

"Summary: There are a lack of organisations reporting on their Scope 3 emissions, which does not measure up to the proposed priority in decarbonising business activities. To incentivise organisations to increase their Scope 3 disclosures, regulations enforced by governments or regulatory bodies as well as corporate policies will be essential.

"Why it Matters: Incentives drive action and therefore organisations have a key role to play in setting internal policies to enforce Scope 3 reporting. Multinational companies can also act as a driving force to encourage government action in expanding reporting requirements to incorporate Scope 3 disclosures and support SMEs in improving their emission measurement and disclosure.
